### The Omaha Works becomes smoke-free

Manufacturing V.P. JR NEWLAND has announced the Omaha Works will become smoke-free in all buildings effective Monday,

Sept. 3, 1990. Although serious consideration had been given to banning smoking on the entire premises, it was decided that smoking would be permitted in three designated sheltered areas in the center mall.

In making the announcement, Newland cited several reasons for the decision, which has been under consideration by Omaha Works management for many months.

"All doubt has been removed relative to the damage smoking does to the health of both smokers and non-smokers who are involuntary breathers of the smoke. In our factory we are also very concerned with poten-

tial fire hazards and growing insurance costs."

Newland reported a recent corporate inspection found numerous smoking violations at the Omaha Works and "we were fortunate that the several fires caused by carelessly discarded cigarettes were all minor."

Omaha's Medical Director DR. RICHARD BARRY cites the growing concern nationwide about the health hazards of tobacco use, saying "From the medical viewpoint, I can only applaud the decision to ban smoking."

In a recently released memo, Newland

stated "not everyone will agree with our smoke-free policy but we feel it's in the best interest of all employees. I urge each em-

ployee to support the policy and help us work for the continued prosperity of the Omaha Works."

AT&T's Omaha Works joins the Phoenix Works in becoming a smoke-free facility. Other local businesses with smoke-free work environments include US West, Valmont and First Data Resources.



## Do you need help to quit?

Smoking cessation informational sessions are scheduled for Tuesday, Aug. 7 in the auditorium. Representa-

tives of the American Lung Association, the Stop Smoking Program and the Smokeless Program of Clarkson Hospital will provide information on each stop-smoking program and costs. Employees may attend the following sessions during their break or lunch periods: 6:30–7:30 a.m., 10:45 a.m.–12:30 p.m., and 3:00.–4:30 p.m.

If a sufficient show of interest exists, the courses may be held on-premises. The company will provide partial financial assistance to AT&T employees participating in smoking cessation classes.



# SMOKING IS LIMITED TO OUTDOOR SHELTERS

After Sept. 3, the only place smokers at the Omaha Works will be able to light up is in three mall shelters soon to be constructed in the inner courtyard.

Mfg. Vice President JR NEWLAND says "these shelters are designed to accommodate our employees who choose to smoke. We're concerned about house-keeping in the shelters, courtyard and factory entrances. Smokers will be expected to light up and discard their cigarettes in the shelter areas only. We'll need everyone's cooperation."

# Shop Talk

A cable shop team led by Engineer JOHN LANGLE was concerned about the mislabeling of 15 different types of duropolymer purgings from the jacketing lines. Not only were containers sometimes labeled wrong, but team members would often discover the proper labels were not available. The labels had to be ordered from the print shop in quantitites of 5,000. Many were lost, damaged or thrown away before they could be used.

The key to the solution was with a machine in another area. In conjunction with the JIT program, the direct inside wire wiring packaging area (Reelex) used a machine in the area to print labels for boxes of wire. Langle's team suggested using the machine in the Reelex area to make the labels for the duropolymer purgings.

This solution provides a much more

efficient means of labeling the purging and also allows the machine in the area to be used for yet another purpose.

Team members BILL BRINK and ARLO OLSEN, IBU 552, felt the team was especially cohesive because the group was a certification team long before becoming a suggestion team. The guys considered the prior experience as a team as a great benefit.

(Reporter's Note: By the way...I interviewed Brink and Olsen for this story because team leader JOHN LANGLE has been vacationing in Hawaii for the last three weeks. Could it be that somehow Langle cashed in all of the team points and headed for the islands?).
