What's So Special About AUGUST...?

National Back to School Month, Aug. 1-31. According to the U.S. Department of Education, private schools represents 24 percent of all kindergarten through 12th grade schools and are attended by 10 percent of students. The USDE also reports that 70 percent of all high school graduates are employed, compared to only 49 percent of high school dropouts.

Sisters' Day, Aug. 3. Held on the first Sunday of every August, this day honors the spirit of sisterhood among biological sisters, sorority sisters, or close female friends. Famous sisters include country singers Loretta Lynn and Crystal Gayle, tennis players Venus and Serena Williams, and advice columnists Abigail Van Buren (Dear Abby) and the late Ann Landers.

International Youth Day, Aug. 12.

This day is sponsored by the United Nations to increase awareness of issues affecting youth, defined as young people ages 15 to 24. According to the International Youth Parliament, there are one billion people in that age range.

Vinegar Day, Aug. 16. This day is promoted by Vinegar Connoisseurs International to celebrate the many varieties and uses of vinegar. According to the Vinegar Institute, the typical grocery store offers 29 varieties, including cider, balsamic, red wine, and rice. The word vinegar comes from "vinagre," French for "sour wine."

Yukon Discovery Day, Aug. 18.



In 1896, gold was found in the Klondike River region of the northwestern Canadian Territory of the Yukon. The local prospectors panned the abundant gold for nearly a year, making themselves "Klondike kings" before word spread. In July of 1897, a steamship from the area arrived in Seattle with more than a ton of gold, and the famous gold rush began. More than 100,000 set out on the arduous journey, but only 30,000 survived the trip, with many dying or turning

National Inventors' Month

National Inventors' Month is celebrating its fifth anniversary this year; it was initiated by the editors of Inventors' Digest. In 1995, the Massachusetts Institute of Technology conducted a survey which found that most people view inventors as old and eccentric. The editors feared that such a perception would discourage the pursuit of ingenuity. "We wanted to get the word out that you can never be too young or too old to invent something that can improve life and change the world, " says editor Joanne Hayes-Rines. The magazine mails free display posters and materials to 5,700 libraries and public schools. According to the most recent annual report of the U.S. Patent and Trademark Office, nearly 300,000 applications for patents are filed annually, with patents issued for about half that number. It takes an average of 22 months to receive a patent. It is said that only 1 in 100 patent holders makes money from his or her invention, but Hayes-Rines says that number is probably on the low side and suggests that perhaps 5 or more in 100 make a

profit. Here are some
other interesting facts
on patents:



- The world's first patent ever granted was to an Italian architect in 1421 for a barge crane to lift marble.
- The youngest patent recipient was a four-year-old girl from Texas who invented a device to make it easier to grasp doorknobs.
- Abraham Lincoln held a patent on a way to make river boats more buoyant and less likely to get stuck on sandbars.
- Mark Twain held two patents -- one for scrapbooks with selfadhesive pages and the other for clothes straps to make suspenders unnecessary.
- Harry Houdini was issued a patent for a safer deep-sea diving suit.
- Jamie Lee Curtis has a patent for a diaper with a pocket for a wet wipe.
 The late actor, Steve McQueen, held a patent for a bucket seat, inspired by his interest in race car driving.

Cooking Corn on the Cob



Sweet corn is one of August's great taste treats. Here are two ways to enjoy it:

On the stove

Husk the corn and remove the silk tassels. Put in boiling water; when the water comes back to a boil, the corn is done. (Don't add salt to the water because it will toughen the kernels and lessen the sweetness.)

On the grill

Husk the corn and remove the silk tassels. Place on a hot grill for eight to 15 minutes, turning every two minutes or so to ensure that all surfaces are exposed to the heat.

Corn should be cooked as soon as possible after it's bought or picked because, once harvested, its sugars start turning to starch.

Vacation Safety



Before you leave for an extended vacation, consider these precautions suggested by the Emergency Services Division of Richmond, British Columbia, Canada:

- Don't leave house keys in outside hiding places. Give a key to a friend or neighbor and be sure to leave your vacation telephone number.
- Arrange for someone to pick up your mail and newspapers every day and have your lawn mowed.
- Ask your neighbors to be alert for suspicious people or vehicles.
- Use 24-hour timers to turn house lights on and off
- Leave drapes and blinds in a daytime position.
- Lock or bolt windows, doors, and outside sliding doors.
- Close all interior doors (to stop the spread of fire and smoke).
- Turn off the water supply to your water heater, washing machine, and dishwasher, and shut off the water heater's circuit breaker.
- Leave a car in the driveway.
- If you have an alarm system, be sure your friend or neighbor has the code.

Be an Active Listener

SPORTS

GREEN BAY, Wis. (AP) --Eric Crouch has quit the NFL for the second time in 11 months. The 2001 Heisman Trophy winner from Nebraska left the Green Bay Packers on the eve of full-squad workouts, which began Tuesday. He had hoped to win a job as one of Brett Favre's backups, but coach Mike Sherman said he had little chance at beating out the three QBs ahead of him in that race. Crouch sat out last season after the St. Louis Rams drafted him in the third round and tried to convert him into a wide receiver. He was set to play quarterback in the Canadian Football League, which he thought could be a springboard to a career as an NFL quarterback, when the Packers claimed him off waivers this spring.

He left camp Monday night after speaking with Sherman and the Packers placed him on the reserve/retired list, retaining his rights.

"We really didn't get into detail. He just said for personal reasons he didn't want to continue. I said OK and we'll leave it at that,'' Sherman said.
"It's disappointing that it didn't work out for us and for him. But we didn't have a whole lot invested in him. He's a good kid, we wish him well.''

North Omaha says welcome home with a Big Bash By Erin Grace

Come Wednesday, north Omaha streets will welcome back their Diaspora, the black sons and daughters who followed jobs, military service, young loves or dreams elsewhere. Thousands are expected to gather for Native Omahans Homecoming Week, which kicks off Wednesday with a gospel night at Salem Baptist Church and wraps up on Blue Monday, so named because people say their farewells.

Organizers this year paired with radio station Hot 107.7 FM to promote the event and hold a dinner and a dance. The celebration again includes a mixer, picnic and parade down historic North 24th Street.

They will be able to see future hopes in the nearly completed Martin Luther King Jr. memorial on the northwest corner of 24th and Lake Streets and in an adjacent building that will house a proposed jazz, cultural and educational center.

An open house at the future center at 2506 N. 24th St., which will be named for Omaha saxophonist Preston Love, will be held in part to begin raising \$500,000 for the project.

"We want to generate excitement for those who live in the area and those who are coming back," City Councilman Frank Brown said.

The homecoming's history stretches back 28 years, when Omaha friends Vera Johnson and Bettie McDonald joined others on a chartered bus to Los Angeles. They were headed to an annual picnic for Omahans there but left dissatisfied with the thrown-together event.

Figuring they could do better, the two planned a regular reunion to be held in Omaha. A Native Omahans Club was born. In 1977, the first Native Omaha celebration, a two-day affair, drew thousands. In following years, the event grew to include fashion shows, bake sales, Palm Sunday brunches and fundraisers for college scholarships. But organizers always kept a focus on the

homecoming.
"We just want everyone
to come home and enjoy,"
McDonald said.
